This is a crudely simulated pglatex input file, as might be produced by the PG posting program from an uploaded LaTeX source file.

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1 Introduction

Before a LaTeX project can be posted, PG's boilerplate, credits, and license must be incorporated into the LaTeX source file. However, these "stanzas" cannot simply be prepended or appended the way they would be with a plain text project, since the result would not be a compilable LaTeX file.

pglatex comprises a pair of programs, pglatex_check and pglatex_post, which facilitate the task of verifying and posting LaTeX projects uploaded to Project Gutenberg. This brief manual describes each program's actions, and outlines the WWer's workflow. Structure of the LaTeX source file is sketched, but covered in detail in a separate manual for DP post-processors (PPers).

1.1 Actions

pglatex_check reads the output of PG's posting program, rearranges the pieces into a preliminary LATEX file for human inspection, and writes a few additional files useful for verifying the PPer's uploaded LATEX.

pglatex_post accepts the WWer-verified LaTeX source file, makes a couple of final updates, and creates zipped LaTeX and PDF files for posting. The program also retains a copy of the compiled PDF for final visual inspection.

2 Work Flow

For definiteness, assume the uploaded project comes in the file project.zip, which unpacks to a LaTeX source file project.tex and (possibly) a directory named images, and that the project is assigned the eBook number 12345.

Here are the raw commands and steps needed to process the project. The actual white washing work is done in the two ** steps; the other steps are described in detail

below. The file renaming in square brackets need not be performed if the output file of the previous step already has the correct name.

2.1 Preparation

Unzip the uploaded file and rename the LaTeX file, giving it the extension .txt. Run the posting program on project.txt, generating 12345-8.txt. If the -8 is missing from the filename, rename the file accordingly; pglatex_check requires its argument to have the form <ebook>-8.txt.

2.2 pglatex_check

The file 12345-8.txt should now contain the following "stanzas", in order: boiler-plate, credits, the PPer's LATEX source and log files, and the PG license text. Run pglatex_check:

pglatex_check 12345-8.txt

At the end of a successful run, the following additional files will have been created:

• 12345-WW.tex: The PPer's LATEX source file, but with the PG boilerplate, credits, and license grafted in for the PPer's "placeholder tags", and with an \ebook macro expanding to the PG eBook number. (The PPer's log file, if any, is removed as well.)

This file is the primary source for the project. If pglatex_check is run again, successive backup files, named 12345-WW.tex-n.bak are created. This protects against accidental overwriting.

- 12345-WW.pdf: The PDF compiled from 12345-WW.tex, for visual inspection during manual verification.
- 12345-PP-notes.txt: The PPer's Producer's Comment block.
- 12345-lprep.txt: The lprep-ed output from the PPer's LATEX source file, for gutcheck-ing and other verification.
- 12345-logs.log: Summaries of warnings from the PPer's log file and the pglaf log file, the list of commands that will be used to compile the project (extracted from the PPer's notes), and other information possibly useful in debugging.
- 12345-PP.tex: The PPer's LATEX source file, with the log file removed.
- 12345-build: An executable shell script containing the PPer's command block. To compile the project manually, do
 - ./12345-build 12345-PP.tex

The script will also compile the WWer's LATEX file.

If the PPer's source file does not contain a "\listfiles" line, the check program prints an error message to this effect and exits. In this event, please ask the uploader to add "\listfiles" to their preamble, re-compile the project, update the log file at the end of their source file, and re-submit the project.

2.3 Manual Verification

The file 12345-WW.tex created in the previous step is now the Primary Source for the project.¹

The PPer's comment block is in 12345-PP-notes.txt. You need not update the PDF Pages line in 12345-WW.tex; pglatex_post handles this automatically.

The file 12345-lprep.txt contains the lprep-ed text, namely the PPer's LATEX source file with the LATEX commands stripped out and replaced by mnemonic tags such as <MATH>. 12345-lprep.txt is roughly analogous to the plain text file of a non-LATEX project, with two important differences:

(i) 1prep may leave false positives; a spellcheck or gutcheck error need not correspond to a real problem with the PPer's file. In such cases, the file 12345-WW.pdf should be consulted to see if the problem is genuine.

¹The program pglatex_post only accepts input files having extension -WW.tex.

(ii) Though you are verifying the lprep-ed text, any necessary changes must be made to a different file, 12345-WW.tex.

2.4 pglatex_post

Once the source file 12345-WW.tex and its compiled PDF have been checked manually, the project is ready for packaging. Run pglatex_post:

pglatex_post 12345-WW.tex

This creates a zip file which unpacks into a directory named 12345. This directory contains the compiled pdf 12345-pdf.pdf, the LaTeX sources 12345-t/12345-t.tex and 12345-t/images, and two zip files—one containing the compiled PDF, the other containing the LaTeX sources. The compiled PDF file should be given a final visual verification before the zip files are pushed to the server, similarly to the final inspection of an HTML file in a non-LaTeX project.

Once the zip files are posted, it should be safe to remove all remaining files; the likeliest exceptions are the original upload project.zip and the human-verified LATEX source file 12345-WW.tex. Everything else can be automatically re-generated. (A copy of 12345-WW.tex, but with the LATEX log file appended, is contained in 12345-t.zip.)

3 Troubleshooting

Most LaTeX-specific problems with a project will be caught before the project leaves DP. However, errors are always possible, and LaTeX's log messages can be difficult to digest.² In the event a project fails to compile or a pglatex program fails to act comprehensibly (or merely behaves contrary to this manual), please contact a LaTeX-knowledgeable white washer, post a message in the DP LaTeX Typesetters team forum, or email pglatex's author.

²For example, the pglatex programs make no checks for unbalanced braces in the PG replacement stanzas. Under certain conditions, unbalanced braces in the PG stanzas can cause cryptic LaTeX errors. If at all possible, unbalanced braces should be avoided.
